- 1) H.R. 1812** – Patient Navigator Outreach and Chronic Disease Prevention Act of 2005 (*Rep. Menendez – Energy and Commerce*)
- 2) S. 643** – A bill to amend the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987 to reauthorize State mediation programs (*Sen. Roberts – Agriculture*)
- 3) H.Con.Res. 47** – Commending the establishment in College Point, New York, of the first kindergarten in the United States (*Rep. Crowley – Education and the Workforce*)
- 4) H.Con.Res. 163** – Honoring the Sigma Chi Fraternity on the occasion of its 150th Anniversary (*Rep. Gerlach – Education and the Workforce*)
- 5) H.R. 2326** – To designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 614 West Old County Road in Belhaven, North Carolina, as the "Floyd Lupton Post Office" (*Rep. Jones {NC} – Government Reform*)

"The Census Bureau reports that the number of uninsured Americans has reached a new high, 45 million. Meanwhile, 9 million children have no regular source of medical care . . . [I]t seems that the only people who are not alarmed about the state of American health care are the ones who could do something about it: the people who run Congress and occupy the White House. There is not one significant piece of health care legislation high on Congress' agenda this year.

President Bush's most significant health care proposal for 2006, a budget cut in Medicaid, would add thousands of families to the rolls of the uninsured. Since Congress last tried to expand health insurance -- with Health Savings Accounts in 2003 -- the number of uninsured people has gone up, not down."
